HUM 120 CULTURAL STUDIES

Prerequisites: ENG 090 and RED 090 or DRE 098; or satisfactory score on placement test

Corequisites: None

This course introduces the distinctive features of a particular culture. Topics include art, history, music, literature, politics, philosophy, and religion. Upon completion, students should be able to appreciate the unique character of the study culture. *This course has been approved to satisfy the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement for the general education core requirement in humanities/fine arts.* Course Hours Per Week: Class, 3. Semester Hours Credit, 3.

- b. explain ways in which economic, social, religious, and aesthetic expressions reflect each other;
- c. demonstrate the ability to research and write about an aspect of the culture under study;

- e. identify ways in which the culture may be seen from a global perspective.
